Some important issues to consider about working post-retirement

The original draft of the questionnaire below was part of a talk I gave to soon-to-retire principals at the 2010 NSWSPC Annual Conference, as part of Warren Marks' series of principal retirement workshops. I have now expanded and adapted it to try to draw out the implications of all the questions I posed at that time.

If you're serious about assessing your expectations and preparedness for work after retirement, try to answer the following questions and then determine what the implications of your answers will be – both in the short-term and long-term – and at a personal and broader level.
