I have been playing bridge for 42 years. I started with a group of friends and have moved up the rankings to play in national competitions representing NSW. In January this year my partner and I came second in the largest competition in Canberra.

Post my leaving the department I will take up leading a bridge group and joining the teaching faculty of my club. There are numerous clubs in NSW, the largest (in terms of membership) would be Willoughby Club on Crabbes Street, Willoughby. There is also the Sydney Bridge Club on Goulburn Street in the city. I prefer the friendly atmosphere and clean venue of my club in Warriewood – Peninsula Bridge Club (the third largest in Sydney).

For the past 30 years I have played two to three nights a week. It is stimulating, challenging and rewarding to do well because you reached the one strategy that enabled you to do better on that one hand than anyone else who played with those same cards. Most nights there are about 30-50 people playing in the room and we play around 28 games each.

If you are thinking of learning it helps, but is not essential, that you have played some form of cards or a strategy game before. Lessons are run at all clubs but Peninsula is widely recognised as having the most effective lessons.
