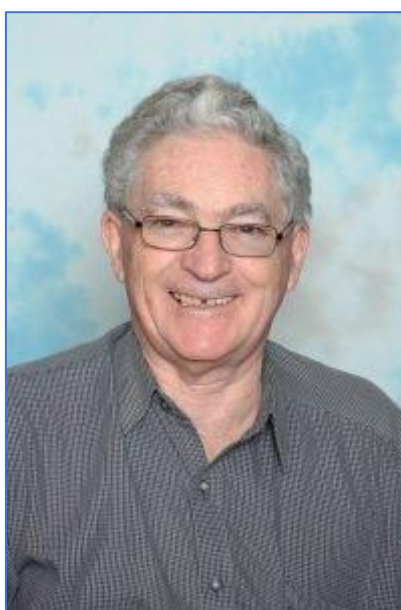


TRIBUTES TO BILL KENNEDY

The following comments were made by former NSW Secondary Principals' Council colleagues of Bill Kennedy shortly after his death on 22 September 2021. Bill was held in very high regard by all those who worked with him as secondary principals, SPC reference group leaders and members, SPC State Assembly delegates, SPC employed officers and SPC executive, including our Deputy Presidents and Presidents. These comments reflect the great diversity of those who admired, respected and appreciated Bill.



BRIAN RALPH

It is my very sad duty to report to you the passing of Bill Kennedy yesterday morning at the age of 83. Bill had a previous medical history of Hodgkin's lymphoma going back many, many years and after three previous very brave and successful attempts to keep this dreadful illness at bay he finally succumbed yesterday.

Bill first became a Principal in the Campbelltown area in the early 80s and then moved to Bulli High School in 1986, where he gave outstanding service to his students and community until his retirement at the end of 1996. In the late 80s and early 90s Bill was Treasurer of the NSWSPC, and then became one of its two Deputy Presidents from 1992-1994. Bill was also heavily involved in the development of the Australian Secondary Principals' Council (ASPA) and was Deputy President of ASPA for several years prior to his retirement.

Bill was awarded Life Membership of the Council in 1998.

Post retirement, Bill took over from Ken Newton as NSWSPC Executive Officer in June 1998, a role that he performed with great distinction until his 'second

retirement' in June 2008. To recognise his outstanding contribution to the Council during this period, the Executive led by President Jim McAlpine established the Bill Kennedy Medal in his honour, which was awarded for the first time in 2009.

Perhaps it is appropriate for me to quote the first part of the citation for the Bill Kennedy Medal that I wrote in 2008, in preparation for its inaugural award in 2009:

The Bill Kennedy Medal

"The Bill Kennedy Medal was initiated at the 2008 Annual Conference of the NSWSPC to recognise the outstanding work of Bill Kennedy on his retirement from the position of NSWSPC Executive Officer. Bill was a long-standing member of the Council, including at one stage NSWSPC Deputy President and Deputy President of ASPA, prior to his retirement as Principal of Bulli High School.

After Bill retired he took up the role of Executive Officer of the Council. Bill performed this role for ten years, giving further distinguished and sustained service to the Council. Major hallmarks of Bill's service included a passion for supporting the work of both the Council and principals for the good of NSW Public Education, provision of expert advice and wise counsel, and the tireless undertaking of his work in a positive, helpful and selfless way."

Bill was a fine man who displayed great dedication to NSW Public Education and who gave outstanding service to the NSWSPC. His passing is a huge loss for all of us.

On behalf of many people who knew and highly respected Bill, I would like to extend our very sincere sympathies to Bill's wife Kath, his daughter Jennifer and her family, and his sons Stephen and David and their families. Unfortunately both Stephen and David live overseas at the present time and were not able to be by his bedside this week.

Kath has informed me that Bill's funeral will be held on Thursday 30th September. As it is a COVID-safe event his funeral will be live-streamed for those who wish to participate. More details will be provided as they come to hand, most probably in next Saturday's *Illawarra Mercury*.

I have just learned that SPC Life Member and stalwart, Bill Kennedy, passed away yesterday morning.

Many of you will know Bill's name, but some of you may not be aware of the significant contribution that he made to the association.

The Bill Kennedy Medal was initiated at the 2008 Annual Conference of the NSWSPC to recognise the outstanding work of Bill Kennedy on his retirement from the position of NSWSPC Executive Officer. Bill was a long-standing member of the

Council, including at one stage NSWSPC Deputy President and Deputy President of ASPA, prior to his retirement as Principal of Bulli High School. He was awarded SPC Life Membership in 1998.

After Bill retired, he took up the role of Executive Officer of the Council. Bill performed this role for ten years, giving further distinguished and sustained service to the Council. Major hallmarks of Bill's service included a passion for supporting the work of both the Council and principals for the good of NSW Public Education, provision of expert advice and wise counsel, and the tireless undertaking of his work in a positive, helpful and selfless way.

In late August he once again showed signs of Hodgkin's Lymphoma back in his system and by mid-September a visit to the specialist confirmed that things were definitely not good. He was admitted to hospital on Friday following significant deterioration in his health. I know that Kath (his wife) and Jennifer (his daughter, who also works at Wollongong Hospital where he was admitted and spent several days by his bedside) were there by his side when he died. There will be a funeral for Bill on 30/9/21 which will be live-streamed (details to follow). Bill was 83. In the last few years Bill also struggled with dementia.

This is, indeed, sad news.

I will make sure that the condolences of SPC are passed on to his family.

I can add my own brief comments as I also got to know Bill from the moment I started coming to Sydney for SPC meetings even prior to being elected to the executive of the SPC.

He seemed to encourage all principals in his own quiet way, but he certainly encouraged me to keep being involved even if I wasn't based in Sydney. We shared many a whiskey (with an 'e') over a couple of decades after meetings and chewed the fat over all world-changing matters.

When he first got lymphoma, the then SPC executive weren't going to let him go and we gave him leave until he recovered, with Pam Wellham filling in for that time. I bought a bottle of Jameson whiskey and told him that it wouldn't be opened until he could share it with me. I think this incentive helped because about 12 months later he was able to resume SPC meetings and on the first night afterwards he came back to the small flat I was renting in the city and between us we managed to make two thirds of the bottle disappear.

Bill and I remained in contact long after he retired, with Bill and I having our birthdays one day and a decade apart. I last spoke to him on the 21st of April this year and he apologised for having difficulties selecting the right words to use but I inserted the best fit words for him and that worked pretty well.

Some of us also had lunch with Bill on a number of occasions in the Wollongong region in recent years and we recycled war stories from our shared experiences. Bill came for lunch two years ago in the Southern Highlands and quite a few of us were able to join him. Fortunately, Terry O'Brien and Lila Mularczyk took photos and were able to find them last night after I broke the news to them. Covid of course intervened in our social gatherings and we weren't able to catch up in person this year.

His daughter Jennifer phoned me late yesterday while Kath phoned Brian Ralph. It was a happy sad conversation as we spoke about her dad and my mate, and she knew all about the many friends Bill had within the SPC. She was glad that Bill only spent a few days in hospital at the end and she was relieved that his suffering was over. All of us have lots of memories of some top times together as well as some great SPC work done with Bill and by Bill. I suppose the Bill Kennedy Medal now becomes a permanent memorial to a man who did so much for the rest of us and expected nothing in return, except for the occasional dram.

Thanks Brian for getting the email string going. I will if it is acceptable to all paste the comments into a document and email it to Kath and Jennifer to add to their memories of a husband, father and grandfather.
